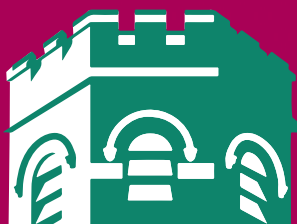

Introduction

St Mary's is a higher educational institution that specialises in teacher education and works in close partnership with Irish-medium schools and professional agencies to deliver an educational experience that is exciting, challenging and deeply rewarding.

The PGCE Primary programme offered at St Mary's is bilingual by design and focuses on the specialist competences required to teach in an Irish-medium immersion classroom, as well as on the general skills, knowledge and attitudes that are common requirements for all effective teachers.

The distinctive environment of St Mary's is caring and collegial. We aim to nurture and develop the skills required to deliver an inspirational pedagogy in Irish-medium classrooms, and staff aim to model this approach in their lectures and workshops. Active learning is complemented by extensive reading and critical reflection. PGCE students will meet and engage with other Irish-medium students from the BEd programme. They will become familiar with current research in education and engage with active researchers in the field of immersion education. They will enjoy the phased experience of three blocks of clinical practice in a range of school environments, including Irish-medium and English-medium.

Students will have the opportunity to engage with the Áisaonad in St Mary's. This is a specialist organisation which produces learning and teaching resources for the Irish-medium sector. The Áisaonad is committed to sharing best practice on the use of its resources. More information about the Áisaonad can be found in this brochure.

The PGCE programme can provide a professional route into a range of careers, and alumni are found in educational bodies, Irish-language media, support services, academia and educational psychology. However, the majority of graduates choose to teach in Irish-medium schools, and their love of teaching in the Irish-medium classroom motivates them to stay on track as lifelong learners. A consistently high employability rate is characteristic of this programme.

St Mary's also works in partnership with Queen's University Belfast and Ulster University to provide an Irish-Medium dimension to students' PGCE Post-Primary experience. The St Mary's course focuses on language proficiency of students and builds competences needed to teach in Irish-Medium Post-Primary settings.

Teaching staff on the PGCE Programme team bring expertise and teaching experience that spans all areas of the primary curriculum. The team includes Senior Lecturers, with subject specialisms and Associate Lecturers who also bring current or recent expertise of teaching in Irish-Medium primary schools.

The PGCE team is led by staff who have developed initial teacher education for the Irish-Medium sector and who contribute to the ongoing enhancement and growth of Irish-Medium Education.

Postgraduate Certificate in Education (Primary)

Programme Outline

The Irish-medium PGCE is a one-year full-time course of professional training for university graduates leading to the award of the Postgraduate Certificate in Education of the Queen's University, Belfast. In addition to this professional qualification, successful students will be awarded the *Teastas san Oideachas Dátheangach* (Certificate in Bi-lingual Education).

This programme is primary designated (5-11 age range), accredited by the General Teaching Council for Northern Ireland (GTCNI) and is recognised by the Department of Education (NI) as an initial qualification to teach in all types of schools. Students who successfully complete the programme may apply for registration to the GTCNI.

Graduates may also apply for registration to the Teaching Council in the Republic of Ireland. Please note that conditions may apply. Registration is a mark of professional recognition as a teacher. Programme Structure and Content

The programme runs from September until June and is thirty-six weeks in duration. Eighteen weeks will be spent in a variety of classroom settings where competences in professional practice are developed. The College will arrange all school placements. They will be in both English-medium and Irish-medium schools. A Gaeltacht experience is a highly valued dimension of the PGCE programme. Students are encouraged to participate in Gaeltacht courses in order to enhance their language competence.

The programme will focus on all three phases of primary education: Foundation Stage, Key Stage One and Key Stage Two. The course is structured in three modules, two of which are at M-Level. Modules have been designed to allow students to integrate knowledge gained from College-based study and from clinical practice. Successful completion of the PGCE (IME) currently entitles graduates to 30 credit points within the College M-Level programme.

Assessment

The Postgraduate Certificate is awarded on the basis of continuous assessment and students must satisfy the examiners in both College-based courses and in practical teaching.

Religious Education

Applicants will also have the option of studying the one-year Religious Education Programme required for teaching certification in Catholic primary schools.

Admission to the PGCE Primary Programme

Requirements

- On admission applicants must possess an honours degree (with classification 2.2 or above) or equivalent from a recognised university.
- Applicants are also required to hold passes (Grade C or above at GCSE) in English Language, Mathematics and Science (or an equivalent qualification) prior to the commencement of the course. Please note that the Essential Skills qualification is not deemed equivalent to Grade C.
- For applicants from the Republic of Ireland, the equivalent qualification for English and Mathematics is Leaving Certificate Ordinary Level Grade O4 or above. For Science, the minimum requirement is Junior Certificate at Higher Level, Grade C or above.
- Applicants must have a high level of competence in Irish, both written and oral, commensurate with competence to teach the primary school curriculum.



Interview

All applicants who meet the minimum requirements will normally be invited for interview and asked to complete a writing task. These are designed to assess an applicant's oral and written competency and suitability for the PGCE programme. It should be noted that possession of the educational requirements does not guarantee admission to the course.

I am a former student of Gaelscoil Uí Dhochartaigh - a school that is much more than just a place of learning; it is a strong and vibrant community. The same is true at Coláiste Ollscoile Naomh Muire, where the lecturers knew us personally and provided continuous support, both inside and outside the classroom.

I applied to this course because I believe in education through the medium of Irish. I want to help nurture the language among the next generation through Irish-medium education. This course has prepared me to pursue this goal with real purpose.

One of the highlights of the year for me was the school placement experience. I had the chance to build strong relationships with amazing pupils and to use the strategies I learned at university as powerful tools in the classroom.

Looking back, it's incredible how much I learned in just one year - from active learning to differentiation - concepts I had little awareness of before but was able to proudly put into practice by the end of the course.

My advice to TICO students? Trust yourself and embrace the challenges. This course will not only shape you into a skilled teacher, but it will also help you grow into a more confident and resilient person.

Irish Medium/and Irish Language Enhancement Course for Post-Primary PGCE students at Queen's University Belfast and Ulster University

Programme Outline

In response to the demand for subject-specific teachers in the growing Irish-Medium Post-Primary sector, St Mary's University College, Queen's University Belfast and Ulster University (Ulster) have formed a partnership to offer a one year Irish-Medium Enhancement course to students interested in becoming teachers in Irish-Medium Post-Primary education.

Additional places have been added to the PGCE intake quotas for Queen's University, Belfast and Ulster University specifically for those applicants who wish to teach in the Irish-Medium Post-Primary sector. On completion of the course, these students will be awarded a Certificate in Bilingual Education (St Mary's University College) in addition to their PGCE qualification (Ulster/Queen's).

Programme Structure

Students will follow the PGCE course designed by either Queen's or Ulster depending on their subject specialism.

Queen's prepares students to teach in the following subject areas: English, Mathematics, ICT/Computing, Science, Modern Languages, Religious Education and Social Science/Citizenship.

Ulster prepares students to teach in the following areas: Art & Design, English with Drama and Media Studies, Geography, History, Home Economics, Music, Physical Education, and Technology & Design.

Bilingual Immersion Education

Irish-Medium students will also complete additional elements in the area of bilingual/immersion education. These will include completing spring and summer Gaeltacht programmes (15 days in total), an induction week in August and an additional week in the following June. This bilingual focus is provided by St Mary's University College, which has a long tradition in preparing teachers to teach in the Irish-Medium sector.

Applying for the Irish-Medium/Irish Language Enhancement Course for Post-Primary PGCE students at QUB and UU.

Applicants will apply to undertake their PGCE studies with either Queen's or Ulster (depending on their subject specialism) and should express an interest in Irish-Medium Education if they wish to be considered for this option. Competence in Irish is required. Usually, this means a GCE A Level or the equivalent qualification in Irish.

A Student View

Conan Glass

I am Conan Glass and I come from Fallagloon in south County Derry. I completed the Irish Language and Irish Medium Enhancement Course in June 2025, which I took on as part of the post-primary PGCE (Science) course I followed at Queen's University Belfast. St Mary's University College, Belfast provided the enhancement course.

It was a challenging beneficial year as I worked to gain the PGCE qualification. I realised how important it is to prepare lessons well and, to consider the various needs of classes and of individual pupils. I also found out how important reflection on practice is while considering my strengths and areas for improvement in my teaching. I have no doubt that the Irish language and Irish Medium dimension of the course was the most enjoyable of the year as,

without having done it, I wouldn't have had the opportunity to teach in an Irish language setting, to learn new scientific terminology in Irish and to inspire another generation to use and improve their knowledge of the Irish language. As a school child I did not attend an Irish Medium school or college which was the case for many on the enhancement course at St Mary's University College and therefore there was an additional challenge ahead of us.

Having done that, I felt that I could take on teaching in an Irish Medium college and we all did well on our school placements. An tÁisaonad

Resource Unit for Irish-Medium Schools

While studying at St Mary's, students will have the opportunity to become familiar with the resources of the Áisaonad which is based in the College.

This is a specialist organisation which produces learning and teaching resources for the Irish-Medium sector. An tÁisaonad was established in 1998 as a response to demand from Irish-Medium schools. There was an urgent need for high quality books, and, until then, all that was available were photocopies and handmade materials. Now, An tÁisaonad has a wide selection of resources to meet the needs of schools.

An tÁisaonad puts great emphasis on its relationship with teachers. Teachers from each Key Stage are represented on the Consultative Committee and in the focus groups which also represent each Key Stage. Drafts of resources are trialed

in schools, and teachers give their feedback before resources are published. An tÁisaonad also organises questionnaires, conferences and workshops to collect teachers' opinions. Over the years, An tÁisaonad has developed a number of innovative projects, including The Early Reading Programme (Cleite), Collins Primary Maths, a series of big books (some with music) and a number of reading series for each level. At present, An tÁisaonad also provides an online news service for schools through the C2K platform – An Seomra Nuachta – with lively interactive articles for schoolchildren.
